# Alumni Spotlight: Steven and Megan Pepin

Steven and Megan Pepin met at the Pittsburgh Oratory during their time at Carnegie Mellon and the University of Pittsburgh. Today, Steven works as a product manager at Microsoft, and Megan is a stayat-home mom and part-time graduate student at the Augustine Institute.

Megan became involved with the Newman Center during her first week at Pitt. At that first Catholic Action (now it's called Newman Night) of the year, she met the woman who would be her Bible study leader, and the rest is history. Before serving as Newman Club president, she had been involved in FOCUS Bible studies and discipleship, so being elected was both a surprise and a gift. God used that experience to prepare the soil of her heart to say yes to becoming a FOCUS missionary after graduation.

Steven first met the FOCUS missionaries and the Newman Club president, Steve Oetjen, during his first week on campus while they were handing out ice cream. As a Catholic ice cream lover, it was a perfect fit! Quickly realizing how much his faith mattered to him, he dove in and got very involved in his faith, fueled by the deep reverence for the Mass he saw at the Oratory. At that time, the Catholic campus ministry was small, and Steven was more or less the de facto choice for president, though he greatly appreciated and treasured the opportunity.

Prayer played a big part in both of their formation. One turning point for Megan was signing up for a 4:00 a.m. hour of Eucharistic Adoration with her roommate during their senior year. Sleepy though it was, that hour became her training ground for prayer and learning to trust God. Despite already having a firm foundation in faith, it was a pivotal moment of deeper conversion and commitment to serve Jesus wherever He called her. For Steven, being asked to lector his senior year inspired a deep appreciation for proclaiming God's Word and a love for the liturgy that he's carried ever since.

For Megan, some of the most powerful experiences of her time at the Oratory came through friendship. She met her best friend at a Newman spaghetti dinner her freshman year, met her husband there, and made countless other deep and meaningful friendships — including with the priests. Rednal also played an important role in her conversion through college, both in attending and helping to lead retreats. Likewise, the Oratory was always an inspiring and welcoming place for Steven. His

freshman year there were three students named Steven and a Father Stephen, which was always a good time. Those friendships, and others formed through the Oratory, inspired him to grow in his faith and become the man he is today.

Steven and Megan first met their freshman year but didn't become close until senior year, when they began seeing each other regularly at daily Mass. A group of friends started meeting afterward for "breakfast club," and that's when their friendship really took off. When Megan joined FOCUS after graduation, Steven respected her one-year dating fast, and when it ended, he asked her on a date.

After college, they carried the spirit of the Oratory into their married life. Steven dove headfirst into parish life in Seattle, starting Bible studies, mentoring others, and sharing the gospel at work. Megan, missing the many daily Mass times and perpetual adoration of the Oratory, sought that same level of devotion and reverence in her missionary work, parishes, and small groups of women.

The Pepins have since returned to living in Pittsburgh and still return to the Oratory when they're able. The Children's Holy Half Hour has been a special gift; getting little ones in front of the Blessed Sacrament in a no-pressure setting has been both beautiful and meaningful for them as parents. Many of their closest friendships still trace back to those years at the Oratory — Steven's men's group and Megan's book club are filled with fellow alumni.

When asked why people should support the Oratory, Megan and Steven responded, "The Oratory provides a haven for faith and an opportunity for students to be nurtured and challenged, taught and inspired, led and encouraged to lead as they grow in their own relationships with Christ and His Church. The Oratorians form people to be holy; holy fathers, holy mothers, holy siblings and mentors."
